GOPDC is an integrated agro-industrial company specialized in the cultivation of oil palm, extraction of crude palm oil and palm kernel oil. GOPDC also produces refined specialty oils for use by the food industry.

GOPDC is currently owned by three Shareholders: - sa Siat nv of Belgium (51%), SSNIT of Ghana (30%) and ATMF (19%).

Siat Ghana Limited has been liquidated. GOPDC now aims at being listed on the Ghana Stock Exchange.

GOPDC has 21,000 hectares of oil palm plantations at Kwae and Okumaning in the eastern region of Ghana, 14,000 of which have been developed for about 7,000 outgrowers. GOPDC's processing facilities comprise a 60 mt/hour fresh fruit bunch palm oil mill, a 60 mt/day palm kernel mill and a 100 mt/day refinery and fractionation plant.

GOPDC is strongly focused on creating value for its produce. This is the driving force behind all the investments taking place. An agro-industrial company such as GOPDC is part of the community and cannot survive without social engagements. We support the communities we operate in not only through the results from our business operations but also in several other ways. GOPDC invests in education, health and the environment because they are essential factors in social development with the aim of improving living standards for the majority of the people.

In our newsletter we see the activities from the last couple of months, though it doesn't show how strong GOPDC is, we survived the heavy storm and became stronger and better.


This was only possible due to the support of the staff, contractors and all involved in the daily operations of GOPDC. Now that we are back in good shape, let's win our Olympic medal.

GOPDC Hosts Group Management Committee Meeting

The meeting was chaired by the Group's Deputy Managing Director Helena Vandebeeck. Also in attendance was Mr. Jean-Serge Nkorouna of Siat Gabon.



GOPDC's New Corporate Social Responsibility Policy

At its meeting on July 22, 2010 at Kwae, the Board of Directors of GOPDC approved a new Corporate Social Responsibility Policy for GOPDC. The new Policy expected to strengthen and enhance the relations between GOPDC and the communities within its operational area, will supersede all previous agreements related to GOPDC's social responsibility programme. Below are excerpts of the new Policy.

- Under the Policy, GOPDC is willing to reserve 2% of its net profit to enhance its Corporate Social Responsibility in its operational areas.
- Distribution of the allocated funds to the different stakeholders within the operational area shall be at the discretion of GOPDC.
- The amount derived will be based on quarterly results of the current year and shall be paid quarterly in arrears as follows: 31st July, 31st October, 31st December and 30th April of the following year.
- The amounts disbursed to the beneficiary communities shall be used for landmark projects such as water, education and health within the respective communities.
- In order to get the beneficiaries well involved and to be a part of the development projects, GOPDC encourages the beneficiaries to as much as possible co-finance such development projects and that such projects shall be jointly managed by the communities and GOPDC where possible.
- The communities shall ensure authority and control over their subjects within the areas granted to safeguard the investment and development undertaken by GOPDC.
- GOPDC reserves the right to unilaterally amend the Corporate Social Responsibility Policy subject to the approval of its Board of Directors.

Hon. Minister of Food & Agriculture visits GOPDC



The Minister of Agriculture, Mr. Kwesi Ahwoi, has paid a working visit to the Ghana Oil Palm Development Company (GOPDC) at Kwae in the Kwaebibirem District to acquaint himself with its operations.

GOPDC is an integrated agro-industrial company which specializes in the cultivation of oil palm, extraction of crude palm oil and palm kernel oil, and also produces specialty oils used by the food industry.

The Minister held discussions with the Company's Management, some of the members of the Board of Directors and Representatives of the Outgrower farmers.

Outgrowers are farmers who are assisted by the Company with high yielding seedlings, fertilizers and training to follow good agricultural practices. In return, the farmers are expected to sell their produce to the Company.

Welcoming Mr. Ahwoi and his team of officials of the Ministry of Food and Agriculture, the Managing Director of GOPDC, Mr. Werner Pirijns said the Company was very pleased to have the Minister in their midst to have an insight



into their operations, achievements and challenges.

He said the Company had 21,000 hectares of oil palm plantations of which about 14,000 hectares for 7,000 Outgrowers at Kwae and Okumaning.

The Company's facilities comprised 60 metric tons of fresh fruit bunches per hour at the palm oil mill, with 60 metric tons per day at the palm kernel mill and a 100 metric tons a day at the refinery and fractionation plant.

Mr. Pirijns said the Company was strongly focused on creating value for its produce which was the driving force behind all the investments taking place.

An agro-industrial company such as GOPDC is part of the community and cannot survive without social engagements and as such supports communities through their business operations and in several other ways.

The Managing Director said, the company was investing in education, health and issues concerning the environment because they were essential factors in social development, aimed at improving the living standards for the majority of the people.

The Minister toured the Company's nursery, plantation and mill and learnt that farmers obtained oil palm seedlings at Two Ghana Cedis instead of the market price of Six Ghana Cedis.

Mr. Ahwoi commended the Company for its achievements and when he learnt that many Outgrowers who were assisted by the Company to set up their farms were diverting their produce to small-scale millers, he advised them to refrain from that practice.

The Minister sited the example of tomato and other farmers who were assisted to produce but sold their produce elsewhere and refused to pay back loans granted them.

When representatives of the Outgrower farmers pleaded for the supply of inputs such as fertilizer on credit, the Managing Director said repayment by farmers had been "horrible", some of them in arrears between four and six years.

He said because of that reason and the level of diversion, the major palm oil companies including Twifo Oil Palm Plantation (TOPP) and Benso Oil Palm Plantation (BOPP) had stopped assisting farmers.



In a related development, the Executive Chairman of Wienco (Ghana) Limited Mr. Henri Wientjes also visited GOPDC in August 2010. Wienco (Ghana) Limited is the principal supplier of fertilizers to GOPDC. As part of his working visit, Mr. Wientjes interacted with some of GOPDC's outgrower farmers during the visit. The Wienco visit coincided with that of the Minister of Food and Agriculture.









Member of Parliament for Kade **Constituency visits GOPDC**

The MP for Kade Constituency paid a courtesy call on the $management \, of \, GOPDC. \, The \, new \, Managing \, Director \, Mr. \, Werner \,$ Pirijns and his Deputy Mr. L.S.K Atsrim assured the MP that the old spirit of friendship and cooperation would continue to exist between the company and MP for the good of the constituency and the District in general. Hon. Ofosu Asamoah, the MP for Kade Constituency used the occasion to announce the death of

his beloved father and invited the management

to mourn with him by giving details of the funeral arrangement. Management also responded appropriately by visiting him formally at his residence at Kade a day before the funeral. A delegation from the management also represented the company on the day of the funeral and donated on behalf of the management: one cow, a carton of schnapps and an amount of one thousand Ghana Cedis (Ghc1,000.00).



Kwaebibirem District Chief Executive visits GOPDC




The Kwaebibirim District Chief Executive, Hon. George Agyemang Duah paid a visit to the company on the 10th of June, 2010. He was received by the Managing Director, Mr. Werner Pirijns and the Community Relations Officer, Alhaji Bashir Manu. The D.C.E discussed a proposal about the construction of the new Kade Market Project during his visit. There is an appeal to the company to assist in the construction of the market. He proposed that the cost for the tiling of the entire market place should be taken up by the company.

Land Valuation Division visits GOPDC

One of the main challenges faced by the Ghana Oil Palm Development Company (GOPDC) in its expansion and development has been Land and Crop compensation.

The company is anxious to resolve all outstanding Land acquisition compensation issues through timely evaluation of Crop and Land compensation by government agencies prior to planting. However, the processes of resolving the issue have been hampered by delays.



In order to have good working relations with the government and its agencies, and also facilitate the process of resolving outstanding Land compensation issues, a seven-member commission paid a three-day working visit to the GOPDC head office at Kwae to have discussions with the management of the

company. Regarding the Okumaning Nucleus Estate, they wanted to know its planting season for the years 2010 and 2011.

Aside the dialogue that yielded mutually fruitful results, the team toured the Okumaning Nucleus Estate. The team saw the recently cultivated seedlings and Land clearance to make way for the planting for this year's planting season and that of next year. They saw at first hand areas where extension of planting has been delayed due to delay in valuation of compensation

for land and crops. The Managing Director, Mr. Werner Pirijns, led the management team of GOPDC while Mr. Baffour Dankwa, Acting Director of the Land Valuation Division, led his team in the discussions.

Within the past 15 years, GOPDC has been transformed into a nucleus estate of 7,270 hectares and small holder / out grower plantings of 13,874 hectares, up from a nucleus estate of 3,850 hectares and 4,250 hectares of small holders / out grower planting some 30 years ago. The original palm oil mill of 20 metric tons per hour capacity modeled on the technology

of the seventies has

undergone a complete refit and expanded to 60 metric tons per hour. A 60 metric tons per day palm kernel oil mill and a completely new state of the art 100 metric ton per day refinery and fractionation plant have been the latest investment.





The I4th Ghana Agribiz Fair held at the Trade Fair Center, La Accra - May, 2010.



Forum for Palm Oil Producers in Eastern and Ashanti Regions on Sustainable Production



Small - scale oil palm growers and palm oil producers and other stakeholders in the Eastern and Ashanti Regions have met at the Ghana Oil Palm Development Company (GOPDC) at Kwae to address serious concern that not all palm oil is being produced sustainably at present.

The meeting, convened at the instance of GOPDC was to enhance broad consultation on how Ghana can produce sustainable palm oil in accordance with the requirements of the Roundtable on Sustainable Palm Oil (RSPO) and was sponsored by Solidaridad of Netherlands, Chemico Ltd and GOPDC.

The RSPO was established in 2003 to address bad practices in the oil palm cultivation and palm oil production.

It was to promote the production, procurement and use of sustainable palm oil and in that regard RSPO has developed a certification system for growers, millers, processors and other stake holders along the supply chain.



Among the attendants were district and regional directors of the Ministry of Food and Agriculture, Officials of Land Valuation Division and the Environmental Protection Agency, District Chief Executives and Assembly Members of some selected districts.





Others were research centers such as the Oil Palm Research Institute, Kusi and the Agricultural Research Centre of the University of Ghana, Legon at Okumaning.

Also present were chiefs and queen mother's as well as family heads of the GOPDC catchment area and representatives of Okyenhene, Osagyefo Amoatia Ofori Panin and the Asantehene, Otumfuo Osei Tutu II.

Participants were welcomed by the Managing Director of GOPDC, Mr. W. Pirijns. He explained that the Ghana National Interpretation Working Group (GNIWG) was established in September 2009 to develop a National Interpretation of the Sustainable Principles and Criteria of the RSPO.

There was the need to adopt good practices in the cultivation and processing of palm oil of international standards.

It was noted that driven by ever increasing global demand for edible oils, the past few decades had seen rapid expansion in the palm oil in the tropics. From the 1990's to the present time, the areas under oil palm cultivation had increased enormously, mostly, in the Malaysia and Indonesia, the World's largest producers of Palm Oil.







It was also noted that whiles better managed plantations and oil palm smallholdings served as models of sustainable agriculture, in terms of economics performances as well as social concern and environmental responsibility, there was serious concern that not all palm oil was being produced sustainably at present.

Producers were therefore warned that if by 2015, they did not adopt sustainable practices their product would not be patronized by international consumers.

A member of the GNIWG, Mr. E.K. Wiafe took participants through the eight principles and criteria for sustainable palm oil production.

These included commitment to transparency, compliance with applicable laws and regulations, commitment to long – term economic and financial viability, and use of appropriate best practices by growers and millers.

The others were environmental responsibility and conservation of natural resources and biodiversity, responsible consideration of employees and of individuals and communities affected by growers and mills, responsible development of new plantings and commitment to continuous improvement in key areas of activity.

The deputy managing director of GOPDC, Mr. Lawrence Atsrim who chaired the meeting asked participants to spread the knowledge acquired to others to adopt sustainable practices in small scale palm oil production.

New Motor Bikes for GOPDC Staff

As part of management commitment to the progress of plantation supervision, new Yamaha motor bikes were presented to some staff in the Agric department of GOPDC. Presenting the keys to the selected staff, the Nucleus Estate Manager, Mr. Emmanuel Duku Boamah advised the field staff to be very vigilant as they ride in the plantation to avoid accidents. He also reminded them to stick to regular maintenance to be able to use the bikes for a reasonable period.



Finally, the beneficiaries were urged to improve upon the 2010 output; this he said would justify the quest for more new motor bikes.

Tapping the Actual FFB Potentials from Okumaning plantation in 2011

This is a just to confirm biblical saying which states "There is time to sow and a time to reap" Yes, even though the 5000ha which is supposed to be the total Concession area for Okumaning plantation has not been achieved, we hope to continue and finish in some few years to come.

Despite our inability to plant the total 5000ha concession, I can boldly say that, we have started reaping the potentials that we sowed about nine years ago.

In brief, the Okumaning plantation started in 2002 and the first batch of young oil palm seedlings were planted in June 2002. Since then, planting continued year after year to date.

Currently, we can boast of 2000 ha with the following (YOP) years of plantings 2002, 2003, 2004, 2005, 2007 and 2008. Development is still on-going for 2011.

Eight year old palm trees with a lot of FFB

In terms of FFB harvesting, the Okumaning plantation can boast of exceeding their targets since 2005 that harvesting started. Current results from the Agric report (Jan-Dec. 2010) indicates that out of the targeted 16,500tons given to the plantation we were able to supply over 18,700 tons of FFB.



We are therefore optimistic that, with good maintenance we would supply more than the 20,000 tons target for 2011.



Again, records from the Agric report as at 31st Dec 2010 indicate that GOPDC-Okumaning produced

12tons/ha from the 8year old trees planted in 2002. However, results from the Experimental plot HES 02 proved that it is possible to achieve 19tons/ha.

Therefore our goal for 2011 is to improve upon the general maintenance on the plantation and the labour situation in particular, so that we can exceed our 20,000tons FFB target and also improve the FFBtons/ha from 12 to 15tons/ha

FROM THE UTILITIES ENGINEER'S TABLE



The quest for optimal utilization of organization's natural resources has begun to assume its frame in corporate anatomy. Industrial waste handling is another area of much concern to organization management, realizing the cost associated. It is for this and other like reasons that Ghana Oil Palm Development Company Limited, GOPDC, has had another definition for waste.

Waste emanating from the mill operations, is now seen as a major input, which is as much importance as the Fresh Fruits Bunch (FFB). Recycling of this waste into useful product is the issue.

Energy is the life-blood of industrial settings, as costly as its importance, such that industries cannot do without it. Energy assumes several forms, ranging from Radiant, Chemical, Thermal or Heat, Mechanical, Electrical and others. Energy can neither be created nor destroyed, but in events of no relevant use, can be a waste. GOPDC Ltd. has dug a little deeper into defining a use for the form of energy available on site. The conversion of energy from one form to the other, as stipulated by the Principle of Conservation of Energy, has been the backbone for the stepping up of GOPDC Ltd. among others. The Chemical energy trapped within the waste of its industrial processes is further utilized through stages of several conversions from one form to the other, and finally, Electrical. However magical as it may seem, the philosophy is a physical process supported by the Principle of Conservation of Energy, which states that "Energy can neither be created nor destroyed but can be changed from one form to the other".

The "waste" from the mill operations, notably Fibre, Empty Fruit Bunches, Shells and Palm Kernel Cake, are readily available on site, with certain proportions of Chemical energy, and hence at different calorific levels. The question remaining then is "Which form of energy would be most relevant and important to GOPDC's undertaking?" Like for any industrial setup, Electrical energy is the most pronounced. How to get there is another issue worth considering. Management of GOPDC Ltd, with all keen interest, had therefore undertaken great investment into the realization of this very useful energy form from the Chemical energy available in the waste.

"waste" fed various proportions into steam boiler, to enhance combustion, leading to transformation of Chemical energy into Thermal or Heat energy. This Heat energy is then impacted into water, well treated to conform to safety requirements, to produce high pressure steam at about 25 bar gauge. This is achieved in a 30 metric tons per hour boiler, supplied by Vyncke. The Heat energy then transported through the steam to a 2.5 MegaWatts Dresserrand Steam turbine, of the extraction configuration, on consideration of the need for low pressure steam for mill processes. A Steam turbine is simply a heat engine, which converts the total









energy of steam into Mechanical energy, specifically, rotation. With this turbine, the steam expands through sets of blade fixed in rows on a rotating shaft, thereby setting the shaft into rotation at 6,060 revolutions per minute. Another phase of energy transformation from Heat into Mechanical is achieved. This turbine offers the flexibility to extract steam at low pressure, 3 bar gauge, after a number of sets of blades, for the mill processes. The rotation of the shaft is transmitted to an Alternator, through a gearing arrangement, with a reduction ratio of 4 to 1, thus reducing the speed to 1,500 revolutions per minute, to suit the operational requirement of the alternator. The alternator produces Electricity.

The relentless efforts of GOPDC technical team, led by Ing. Lawrence S. K. Atsrim, the Technical Director and current Deputy Managing Director, and Mr. Daniel Meulemans, the Group Technical Director of factories, there is a continual closure of the gap between actual and expected realization of green power availability on kilowatt-hour consumption.

TECHNICAL

UPDATE OF THE MILL

The Technical Services has seen some changes in recent times; changing inefficient machinery and worn-out parts being replaced. Not only does this reduce downtime but also makes our operations ecological friendly.

The smooth operation of the boiler, turbine and water treatment enhances smooth production (mill and refinery) since power, steam and water which are in constant demand, are well supplied for production and other uses.



There has been an issue of ceasing all avenues in implementing waste management by recycling waste products from the milling processes for the production of green power. It is in this light that the new empty bunch conveyor was constructed to ensure there is constant shredding of empty bunches to be used by the boiler house.

The shell elevator that conveys the shell from the shell bin has been changed to ensure that there is constant feeding of shells to the boilers (old boilers as well as the Vyncke boiler).

Removal of kernel moisture is a necessity to effective crushing. The installation of the new heaters for the kernel silos has ensured that the kernel for PKO production is prepared for crushing with a higher extraction rate of the oil and reduction of the oil in the press cake.

WHY YOU NEED VITAMINS

The common causes of vitamin deficiencies include poor eating habits, alcoholism, emotional stress, the improper absorption of vitamins (usually due to liver or intestinal disorders), the intake of medicines that interfere with the ingestion of vitamins and lack of exposure to sunlight. If you constantly feel sluggish and suffer from chronic health-related inconveniences, you might be short of the vitamins your body needs to function properly. Doctors will usually prescribe supplements. However, keep in mind not to overdo it, as an excess of vitamins can also be harmful.

Vitamins cannot be assimilated without ingesting food. This is why it is suggested that vitamins must be taken with a meal. They help to regulate the body's metabolism, assist in forming the bone and tissue, and help convert fat and carbohydrates. However, one must remember that vitamins cannot replace food.

The vitamins group can further be broken down into specifics depending on how they function in the body. Examples are vitamins A, B, C, D, E, etc

Functions of Vitamin A

- Repair & growth of body tissues
- · Protects mucous membrane of mouth, throat, lungs and nose
- · Helps maintain smooth, disease-free skin
- Counteracts night blindness.
- Reduces risk of lung and certain types of oral cancers

Palm oil contains vitamin A. During the refining process, the oil is exposed to very high temperatures and hence an amount of this Vitamin A is lost.

For this reason GOPDC now fortifies its refined oils with Vitamin A.

So rest assured that any time you consume any refined product from GOPDC, you have actually consumed oil with the right proportion of Vitamin A. This is certified by FDB.

SOCIAL ISSUES

The Technical Services Department took part in the May Day worker's festivities. In a soccer gala tournament organized by GOPDC for the various departments, the Technical Services came runner up to Agric Services. It is believed that next year the officiating would be made better.

HIV/AIDS DEPARTMENTAL TRAINING WORKSHOP REPORT



HIV over time has been one of the serious health problems in every part of the world, and most especially in Sub-Saharan Africa. In the industrial sector, it poses a lot of threat to productivity which leads to great profit loss. This is due to the fact that, companies with workers infected with this virus tend to spend their profit on health insurance policies, Hospital bills, Funeral cost among others. GOPDC being aware of this important fact organized a workshop regarding HIV / AIDS for its workers and their wards at GOPDC Junior High School (JHS). The purpose of this workshop was to educate the workers on the implications of this virus, how it is acquired or its causes and transmission, its symptoms and prevention, Counseling and testing (CT), Treatment through ART, information on the

correct use of condoms and also deal with some of the misconceptions they had about the virus.

The workshop training was scheduled to commence on the I4th of July, 2010 and end on the 3rd of August, 2010. The workers were categorized into their various sections and notices were prepared and placed on notice boards for the workers to be sure of their date for the workshop. The sections that participated in the first week of the workshop include JHS Students and Teachers from the GOPDC School, the Management and Senior Staff and the Office staff i.e. Agric, Finance, Corporate, Agric Out Growers/ SMH/ FCA staff.

In the second week, the participants were workers from Workshop and Stores sections, the Transport section, and then the Agric – Okumaning Group Leaders. Workers from the Mill and Refinery had theirs from the 27th of July, 2010 to the 29th of July, 2010. Participants to the workshop were advised by facilitators to quit certain behaviors such as using drugs like Viagra and China drugs (currently about 25 types of such drugs are available in the market) before they had sex and also avoid having sex with people they hardly know. They were also advised to visit a health center to check their HIV status to enable them live a healthy life. Again facilitators advised workers at the workshop to be nice to people infected with the virus since they need their love and support.







The final group which is the Agric- Kwae Estate GP Leaders (Maintenance team) and the Agric- Kwae Estate GP Leaders (Harvesters team) had their workshop training Scheduled for the 2nd and 3rd of August 2010, respectively. In all five hundred and ten boxes of male condoms and over three hundred and four female condoms were distributed to participant.

Staff here are divisional heads and nursery supervisors. The various divisions include Division I, Division II and Division III. The under-listed are some of the activities handled by the supervisors:

- Field visits in the morning to organize and supervise the various activities done on the field for each day which include maintenance (slashing, ring weeding etc.), fertilizer application, harvesting, pruning and loose fruit collection.
- Updating records on the activities done in the day.
- Checking and signing daily worksheet for the various field operations from each gang which is later forwarded to the Nucleus Estate Manager.
- Making requisition for tools and equipment needed by field workers to carry out their activities.
- Preparation of weekly forecast on Fridays for the following week's activities needed to be done which include where to harvest, slash, apply fertilize etc.
- Assisting the Nucleus Estate Manager in sanctioning daily worksheet.
- Any other work assigned to them by the Nucleus Estate Manager.

Stores management and control: Responsibility of all



Stores management: **finance** or **operation** function?

Finance:

Materials stock to finance managers is money invested by the organization and so have a very significant impact on the financial base of the organization. The management of stores is therefore one very important function that attracts the attention of finance managers.

- The value movement of stock must be known and the closing value declared in the financial year closing report.
- Materials and associated cost must be factored into production cost/sale price determination
- Information on stock turnover must be available to expose obsolete and redundant stock for value adjustment in the financial year closing report
- · Advise top management on stock acquisition policies in terms of how much is available to spend etc. among others

Management at Stores:

Due to the huge investment normally involved in stock, finance managers are very interested in controls (administrative in nature) at the stores where stock are kept. The huge amount in working capital that is sitting there in stock must be properly accounted for. Since there are many users of stores there is the need to have a control system which hands over the accountability for stores from one departmental area of responsibility to another, so that, this huge money or stock would translate into a positive expenditure. To realize the objectives above, controls must also be such that information is forth coming and accurately for users.

Operation:

Materials stock to operation managers is materials kept in pool as assurance for uninterrupted usage for the achievement of their core and ancillary operation targets. The consequences of inadequate stock and or lack of it could impact negatively on the overall profitability of the organization in the form of production shortfall. To the operation managers therefore, the inadequate stock or lack of it is a serious concern. Because of the above consideration they are equally interested in controls at the stores, basically of physical and information inflow and outflow. Controls that would ensure that:

- · Physical structures meet standards for safe and organized storage
- Items are physically present and in the quantities as indicated by information available
- · Arrival of new purchased items were duly announced and inspected
- · Low stock and stock-out were promptly informed
- · Realistic stock levels are set and continually reviewed
- Reduce stock varieties and eliminate items duplication
- Proper description and identification of items, example: nomenclature
- · Conditions that create Obsolete and redundant stock were eliminated
- · Items were properly stocked and in the right condition

Management at usage points (production, maintenance, field & offices etc.):

User managers

Management of materials at usage points, mainly production, engineering & maintenance, plantation fields are of equal if not more important as at the stores. It is a fact that, a little upward adjustment in product price could affect sales negatively. Since materials cost is an important element in product/sales price builds up user managers have a bigger role in ensuring that waste and abuses at usage points were reduced to the barest minimum by putting in place the necessary administrative mechanism

General staff:

Stores management is a collective responsibility. The general staff is not directly involved in stores management and control administration, but no meaningful gain can be made in this activity without their contribution. The savings in materials consumption reduction would be much bigger if the entire staff is part of the process. Some of the contributions they could make are for example:

- · Avoid spillages of liquids whilst applying or serving
- Drivers observing approved driving methods and routes to conserve fuel
- Field staff applying the approved quantity, example: fertilizers and chemicals
- · recycle papers for reuse
- and prudent use of consumables devoid of abuses
- take good care of items drawn from stores, use them as approved among others

User managers would best know where to save on materials usage but creating the awareness among general staff would make their job easier.

Should stores operate under finance or operation department or operate as a department?

This decision will vary from one establishment to another. **There is no hard and fast rule**, but the following considerations among others would inform first, the decision to operate stores as a department or not:

- The size of the establishment
- · The scope of responsibilities, roles and functions assigned
- The type of industry and main category of materials stored
- Is it a specialized store serving mainly one specialized department and rendering relatively minor services to other users or equally serving multiple departments of different specialties?

GOPDC stores stock wide variety of items and serve multiple departments of equal specialties: mill, workshop, plantation/general, medical, agro chemicals, fuel and lubricants, office and IT. It is a section under finance department. It has several storehouses located at the premises of the various departments that it serves. Materials stocked in each storehouse are those which the department is a major user.

Which department then should have oversight responsibility over the various stores?

Allowing each department in this circumstance to take charge of its own stores could result in:

Lack of cohesion and coordination, weak organization, just to mention a few, but above all, uniformity in control and operational procedures may also suffer. Even if allowed, which department takes charge of general items that do not directly fall under any particular area like stationery, fuel and lubricants etc?

Centralization of management and administration has the advantage of taking care of most of these lapses, if not all. It has some disadvantages but needless to mention in this article; as its (article) focus is on GOPDC stores which has been centralized.

Fundamentally, materials stock is money, complex financial information preparation; gathering and reporting are required for materials acquisition and movements, right from the decision to acquire to the point of release for use. All management and controls of stores are therefore principally structured towards the safeguard and movement of money for the production of money. Therefore, a centralized administration for stores that has not met a full department status would normally fit into finance which has the expertise in money administration and management.

Against the fact that, operation departments already have a heavy schedule of meeting production, machinery maintenance and field targets, and so, much of their attention focus is heavily on meeting those targets and associated challenges which come alongside with huge volume of record production, record keeping and information dissemination roles. Adding stores administration, also a specialized function may result in overloading of responsibility. There is also the possibility of compromise in effective recordkeeping if major users are the custodians at the same time. All things being equal, it will serve better to allow the operation departments concentrate on their core jobs where they have the expertise.

Of course, unintentionally though, sometimes finance managers are drawn very deep into core finance challenges and demands, thus pushing their oversight responsibility role over the stores to oblivion, but this shortfall could be made up if a strong audit culture is enforced; backed by the support of operation managers.

Operation departments are major stakeholders in stock administration. Stock administration would not achieve objectives and goals required without their active involvement. Their involvement in major decisions in the administration of store is crucial to make it operate efficiently and render optimum reliable service.

All said the bottom line is collaboration. We will all gain if savings in materials usage translate into cheaper product and result in higher sales.
